HOME ECONOMICS 8 TO 10**GRADE COLLECTIONS****OVERVIEW OF COMPREHENSIVE RESOURCES*****Fashion!***

(Grade 9, Grade 10)

This resource package, consisting of a student text, student activity guide and instructor's manual, presents an in-depth examination of the fashion and clothing industry and of design and production processes. The student text is divided into six chapters that cover fashion terminology, artistic influences, garment styles, price markets, patterns, retailing, textile science, designing, colour, consumers, clothing care and careers. Numerous colour photos and illustrations enhance text and help explain concepts. Each chapter includes review and follow-up activities and the text includes a comprehensive glossary and index. The student activity guide contains 125 non-reproducible exercises that review and recall concepts from the text. Activities range from simple word scrambles to essay questions, sketching assignments and critical thinking exercises. Chapters correspond to student text. The instructor's manual provides teaching strategies, test masters, answer keys and evaluation tools. Chapters correspond to student text.

Fashion! is also recommended as a comprehensive resource for the Textile Studies 11 and 12 Grade Collections. Specific chapters have been highlighted for grades 9 and 10 in order to distinguish support for Home Economics 8 to 10. For grade 9, the most relevant chapters are 2, 8 to 12 and 16 and for Grade 10 they are chapters 2 and 8 to 12.

This text-based resource does not support learning outcomes that allow students to demonstrate a variety of sewing techniques nor does it allow them to examine and understand the safe and appropriate use of sewing equipment. At this point in time, for all three grades and specifically for Grade 8, teachers will need to find other means to supplement the existing program with resources not found in the Grade Collections in order to satisfy curricular requirements.

Food for Life

(Grades 8, 9, 10)

This Canadian hardcover resource explores people's food habits, choices and preparations in the context of cultural, nutritional, psychological and social factors. The text is organized into five units: "Food Perspectives," "Personal Food Choices," "Food Preparation," "Global Perspective" and "Science of Food." Each unit is divided into several chapters. Many chapters highlight careers. Each chapter concludes with questions about key terms and activities, which require demonstration and application of knowledge. Numerous colour photos and illustrations enhance the text. A thorough glossary and index are also included.

"Global Perspectives" offers multicultural recipes and incorporates discussion on Canadian food heritage from the perspective of First Nations people and regional Canada.

The teacher's guide for this resource is not recommended.

The Living Family: A Canadian Perspective
(Grade 9, Grade 10)

This resource consists of a hardcover student text and a teacher's resource package in a three-ring binder. The text discusses characteristics of the historical and contemporary Canadian family in the context of changing family theories and concepts. The 20 chapters cover topics including the idea of family, family and society, relationships, marriage, children, adolescence, mid-life and aging. Each chapter contains a list of learning objectives, an introduction, a case study with follow-up questions and tasks to tackle the challenge presented, questions for progress check, a summary, a list of key terms and activity suggestions. A comprehensive bibliography, index, and source lists organized by chapters are provided at the end.

When using this resource, teachers should be aware that some cultural generalizations are noted and that references about First Nations or other multicultural groups are often simplistic.

The teacher's resource package includes lesson suggestions, teaching strategies and answer keys for each chapter as well as blackline masters for independent study projects, self-evaluations, teacher evaluations and essay topics.

The Living Family: A Canadian Perspective is also recommended as a comprehensive resource for Family Studies 11 and 12 Grade Collections. Specific chapters have been designated for Grades 9 and 10 in order to distinguish the support for Home Economics 8 to 10. The most relevant chapters for Grade 9 are 4, 10, 11, 12, 14 and 15 and for Grade 10 are chapters 11 and 12.

Parents and Their Children
(Grade 10)

This resource comprises a hardcover student text, a softcover student activity guide, a hardcover teacher's annotated edition, a softcover teacher's resource guide and a teacher's resource binder. Test creation software has not been evaluated. Although the text is American in content this does not detract from its usefulness.

The nineteen chapters in the student text are user-friendly and approach the study of family from a parenting perspective. Each chapter deals with one of the following topics: parenting decisions, the beginning of parenthood, growth and changes during parenthood and challenges of parenting, and concludes with a summary, review questions and activities. The supporting student activity guide provides opportunities for reinforcement and extension.

The comprehensive annotated teacher's edition provides lesson suggestions, scope and sequence and teaching aids. The teacher's resource guide provides correlation among the components, transparencies, strategies for enrichment/extension and answer keys. The teacher's resource binder combines the above-described teacher's resource guide with the transparency packet, which is also available separately. The transparencies support and extend the text.
